

The Cheapest, Easiest, Fastest Way to get an Alberta Education High School Diploma

Ages Birth to 14 years: Self-direct (unschool) learning by play, games, research and projects.

Ages 15-18 years: Follow the plan below

First Year - Register with a home education supervising school board that offers Section 6 of the Home Education Regulations. Student must switch from 22 SOLO to APS outcomes.

Fill out and send in course proposals for the following grade 10, 11, and 12 option courses. Log time, photograph and document activity for 125 hours each course/grade level. Giving 1.5 hours per day per course, Grade 10 courses could be done September-November, Grade 11 in December-February, and Grade 12 in March-May.

Special Projects 10, 20, 30 – this can be anything a child is interested in!

Physical Education 10, 20, 30

Food Studies 10, 20, 30 levels

Calm 20

= 48 credits

Next Year – register with any school to take the following teacher-taught courses:

Ages 18-19 years – waiting to this age to report credits entitles waiver of pre-requisites.

Register with a school to take the following stand-alone Grade 12 courses, or register with a homeschool school board and study the textbooks, The Keys, the online courses posted at www.learnalberta.ca/t4t/ and challenge the Diploma exams. Warning: after age 20, these courses are no longer funded and cost about \$500-1000 each. Do it before the child is age 20 on September 1. Student can self-study grade 10 and 11 levels but not report credits yet.
